Reflection

As we continue in this period of Resurrection hope, we meet two people on the road from Jersualem to Emmaus. They are so focused on their problems and disappointment of the events of the past days, they don't recognise the stranger who appears beside them.

They were obviously anxious and their world had been turned upside down as ours has now. How can it be that this stranger doesn't know what has happened? Can you imagine coming across someone at the moment who hasn't heard of Coronavirus?

One thing that we note is that Cleopas and his companion took time to stop and learn from the stranger. They didn't just rush on by. Conversations when walking alongside people are important. It can sometimes be easier to have difficult conversations when side by side rather than face to face. They are in the moment, eagerly listening and learning from Jesus.

At this time when we are asked to Stay at Home, we might take the opportunity to get to know Jesus better in extra Bible reading and prayer.

When they get to their home, Jesus doesn't push himself onto the couple, he makes as if he is going to carry on. Something encourages them to invite him in and they are rewarded as they realise that the Risen Jesus has been with them all the time, as they share food.

Do we recognise Jesus with us at difficult times or are we tempted to rely on our own abilities? In this unusual time, it is important to keep looking for signs of resurrection hope. This week it has been heart-warming to see Captain Tom doing his 100 laps for the NHS and the generosity of the public in donating to the cause. (£23million at the time of writing.) There are people sewing items for the NHS around the country. There are rainbows decorating houses that make us smile. I have included a photo of a decorated fence that cheered me up as I walked by. On Thursday evenings many of us are clapping for the NHS and other keyworkers, which has an unexpected benefit that neighbours who might normally see each other about once a year are smiling and chatting and supporting a shared cause. We are rediscovering a sense of community. Let's keep looking for ways to encourage one another, however small they may seem.



Jesus allows us to choose whether to invite him in to our lives. Jesus says come to me you who are weary and I will give you rest. We are welcome as we are. No special qualifications or preparations are needed. At this time when we might be finding it difficult to stay hopeful we can call out to God as David did in the Psalms.

The snares of death encompassed me, the pains of hell took hold of me By grief and sorrow I was held. Then I called upon the name of the Lord O Lord I beg you, deliver my soul. Gracious is the Lord and righteous Our God is full of compassion (Psalm 116:3-5)

After Jesus left, Cleopas and his companion, they got up and ran back the 7 miles to Jerusalem to tell everyone else. It is hard to imagine that as we are restricted to one period of exercise a day and many have to stay indoors. Can we capture this kind of enthusiasm in our lives? How can we share our resurrection hope with those who might be struggling at this time? As well as helping in practical ways, we can share our moments of joy as we talk to others, noticing the signs of spring, sharing stories of people helping others and of how our faith gives us peace. The current situation means that one of the popular ways of meeting people is via video over computers, tablets and phones. There are quizzes, fitness groups, virtual choirs and various types of virtual church to name but a few. I have been fortunate to take part in a virtual choir singing an arrangement of The White Cliffs of Dover, a song with an uplifting message from World War II that resonates again now. The organiser thought that about 30 people might join in and was pleasantly surprised to find that there were over 200 contributions from 13 countries. The end result is very uplifting and is bringing joy to a large number of people, including those who have lost loved ones to the virus.

As we move through the Easter period, we start to think about Pentecost which this year we mark on 31st May. After the resurrection appearances, Jesus tells the disciples to stay in the city until you are clothed with power from on high (Luke 24 v48). We have further weeks to stay at home until the spread of the virus decreases. This might include learning some new skills or simply learning to be still in God's presence. However it is, let us take some time out to seek the

guidance of the Holy Spirit so that we might emerge from this period confident in the power of God to transform lives.
