
Worshipping Together

Prayer

This month we take time to reflect on one of the foundational practices of the Christian life – Prayer. Why prayer? What should we pray? How should prayer make a difference to my life?

We begin with how Jesus taught his disciples to pray, and then explore other passages of scripture that will help us reflect on praying for guidance, for the church, and finally prayer as reorientation – a means by which God reveals real hope to us.



Worshipping Together comprises an act of worship for the month, with a different set reading and reflection for each week, shared as a starting point for your own reflections. As you worship and draw closer to God, may God draw close to you, speak to you and journey with you beyond the words of these pages, strengthened by God's ever-present Spirit.

Gathering prayer¹

Lord, you are here, waiting for me —
longing to hear my prayer, wanting me to be here in your presence.

Sing the following hymn, or a favourite of your own: Lord of all hopefulness²

- 1. Lord of all hopefulness, Lord of all joy, whose trust, ever childlike, no cares could destroy, be there at our waking, and give us, we pray, your bliss in our hearts, Lord, at the break of the day.
- 2. Lord of all eagerness, Lord of all faith, whose strong hands were skilled at the plane and the lathe, be there at our labours, and give us, we pray, your strength in our hearts, Lord, at the noon of the day.
- 3. Lord of all kindliness, Lord of all grace, your hands swift to welcome, your arms to embrace, be there at our homing, and give us, we pray, your love in our hearts, Lord, at the eve of the day.
- 4. Lord of all gentleness, Lord of all calm, whose voice is contentment, whose presence is balm, be there at our sleeping, and give us, we pray, your peace in our hearts, Lord, at the end of the day.

Below are readings and reflections for each week through November.
This month we reflect on the importance and purpose of prayer in nurturing faith
and our relationship with God.

These reflections are mere starting points, and you are encouraged to ponder and pray through and beyond what is written, as you listen and respond to God.

The Lord's Prayer

Week beginning Sunday 7th November

Reading: Matthew 6:7-15

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy Name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread.

And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us.

And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil.

For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory,
forever and ever. Amen.

When Jesus shares with his disicples the Lord's Prayer, he does so saying do not make your prayers complicated or shallow. Jesus calls on the disciples to pray from the heart, and to pray knowing God already knows their needs.

Do you ever wonder what to pray? Do you find yourself in a place of not knowing how to find the words to speak to God? I remember a time in my life when I couldn't pray, but sitting in a congregation hearing others praying this prayer, I felt God saying to me, 'I know you can't find the words right now, but this congregation is praying this prayer for you as well as for me.'

God knew my needs, and through that moment, I knew I was not alone, God was with me, and so too was the community I was worshipping with. Our prayers be they the words of the Lord's prayer or our own words, are not just for ourselves, not just for God, but also for one another – the community of God's people.

Reflect: How do you pray when you can't find the words?

Pray: Pray through the Lord's prayer line by line, reflecting on the phrases as you go.

Praying for Guidance

Week beginning Sunday 14th November



Reading: Psalm 25:1-7

Make me to know your ways, O Lord; teach me your paths. Lead me in your truth, and teach me, for you are the God of my salvation; for you I wait all day long.

Psalm 25 is a wonderful prayer of David, who seeks to centre his day, his life, his service, in God. In centring himself in God, focusing on God's will and way, David seeks God's guidance and wisdom for living.

In our busy world it can be easy to go about in our strength — especially if things are easy. I was talking to someone the other day who shared a story of someone saying to them, 'I come to church when I need it, but if things are easy, I don't need to'. When things are easy, do you carry on in your own strength, or keep seeking God?

In verse 7 David testifies to God's goodness and steadfast love. David's prayer teaches us that we should pray not out of our strength, but out of a desire to seek God's strength. Our faithful living is strengthened and nurtured by seeking the guidance and wisdom of God.

Reflect: How do you need God's guidance today?

Pray: Come before God in prayer, bring before him what you need guidance for, and humbly listen out for God's guidance – you might hear a voice, have a feeling or a nudging, or a name, place or bible verse come to mind. All are some of the many ways God can speak and give us guidance.

Praying for the Church

Week beginning Sunday 21st November

Reading: Philippians 1:9-11

Philippians is a letter from Paul to the church in Philippi. Paul was in prison, writing to the Philippians to thank them for a gift they had sent him when they learnt he had been imprisoned. Some call Philippians the 'letter of joy' because it is a theme that flows throughout the letter.

Here at the start of the letter Paul tells the Church in Philippi that he is praying for them, and what he is praying. In saying what he is praying, Paul is perhaps also preaching to the people – I'm praying you will overflow with love for one another. I am praying you will deepen in your knowledge of God. I pray you will seek God's guidance for the right way to live. Anyone who hears that letter would, one would hope, recognise that for that prayer to become a reality, the people have a part to play in making it become so.

When we pray for one another, our church, the church of God, we are not praying for something separate to ourselves. We are praying for something that we have the joyous privilege of being part. When we pray for the church, we also have to be listening to hear God revealing to us the part we have to play.

Reflect: What part are you playing in building up God's church?

Pray: For your church, its leaders and its people – and for more joy!



Prayer of Reorientation

Week beginning Sunday 28th November

Reading: Jonah 2

I was done.

Overwhelmed, submerged, a ton of pressure on top of me, descending deeper and darker, I could not find my way up.

Swirling, swooning, sweating.

Drowning, dreading, dropping.

I hit rock bottom.

How did I get here? How did it happen so fast?

I'm still here in this hell. Still in the depths with no strength to rise.

Yet the miracle is – I'm still here.

The Lord has preserved me – a quiet place of waiting in the belly of the beast.

A little hope stirs that there's a reason for it;

that God will lift me out of this; that I am not done.⁴

Jonah ran, sank & nearly drowned. Jonah thought hope had gone, and then, a little hope stirs. As we continue to navigate pandemic, there have been times when hope has been harder to grasp than others. Jonah's story reminds us that no matter how dark things get, hope can always stir among us, enabling us to re-orientate ourselves to focus on God who always offers us hope.

There is also another story that reminds us hope is always stirring. Today is the first Sunday of Advent, a season of the church year that reminds us that something is coming. And that something is hope, it is light, it is redemption. Into the darkness of the world a light is coming and has come - to bring hope to the world.

Reflect: How have you known hope lead you to God?

Pray: That this advent season you would know the strengthening stirrings of Hope in Christ.



For those who sleep each night, unsure what the next day will bring, Your kingdom come, your will be done


For children dispossessed of childhood and transformed into soldiers Your kingdom come, your will be done
